We are stronger together!


You transform lives. Since 2003, you have enabled us to save hundreds of horses and enrich human lives through education.

In July, 2023, Grey was adopted. Though it's bittersweet, with a mix of joy for his new life and sadness for not having him here with us, we couldn't be happier for this boy.

We don't look for quick homes, we wait for the right homes. We like to let the horses choose their people. When Grey's new mom came to visit, Grey went right to her with love and compassion. She rode him in the arena and they looked like they'd been doing that forever.

After a ride, she let Grey eat grass and they just hung out together. When we stood back and watched, she wept and Grey stayed close. They said to one another; "You're the one I've been waiting for". The feeling was clearly mutual.

Before Grey headed home, volunteers and staff came to say so long to their friend. We

talked to him every day and told him where he was headed and how happy he would be. He heard us, because he hopped aboard the trailer and unloaded on the other side with joy in his heart. The first thing he did when he got off the trailer was roll and make his expressive grunts. His new mom sent us a video of a contented horse with a full heart, and in her voice and soft laughter at his vocalizations, we could hear her love for him.

Grey is home -- forever -- and it was worth the wait.

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HEAVEN GAINED AN EQUINE ANGEL



In October, 2023, we said a heartfelt and sad goodbye to Bijou.

From the time we rescued Bijou in 2005, she battled ailments from her past life. She came to us after a bull buffalo fractured her skull with his horns; her scar prominent on her beautiful face. Shortly after arriving at our farm, she was diagnosed with intestinal scarring from years of having worms that were left untreated. We managed that with medications. She had a nearly severed tongue from a harsh bit that caused issues with chewing, so she always used her water trough to wash the wads of hay from her tongue. And she was lame when she arrived and would not stand for the farrier. With patience and time, we helped her find comfort with special shoes. Despite all she'd been through at the hands of others, at our farm, she gave only love and forgiveness.

For about a year, Bijou's health had been declining. She was diagnosed with Cushings Disease in 2022, but could not tolerate the medicine required to treat it. Through the decline, her spirit, energy, and enjoyment of all things remained strong, so we kept caring for her medical needs and ensuring she had a good quality life for as long as we could.

This fall, her health decline accelerated, and her qualify of life decreased rapidly. Knowing in our hearts her days were numbered, we let her out on her favorite hill to enjoy the sunshine the day before the vet was scheduled to come. It was her last best day, as our vet said.

Our veterinarian, Dr. Amanda DeFranco, helped Bijou make the transition to greener pastures. We held Bijou and told her we loved her until she took her last breath. Run free sweet girl. You will always be loved, and always in our hearts.

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EMPOWERING THE NEXT GENERATION

Crane Mountain Valley Horse Rescue is proud to provide young people with opportunities for professional development, leadership, and experiential learning.

This year, we welcomed Nelson for summer employment (top right scratching Mini with a soft leaf rake; it's her favorite thing). Nelson helped with animal care, special projects, and garden management. The latter was a specific assignment to align with his goal of going to college to study botany.

James (middle) volunteered at CMVHR for eight hours to earn his Citizenship in the Community merit badge with Boy Scouts. This honorable recognition requires the scout to choose a charitable organization that "brings people together to work for the good of the community" for their volunteer service.

James shadowed co-founders, Eddie and Nancy, for experiential learning, and came armed with thoughtful questions about the ins and outs of non-profit management. In this photo, he is raking the sand in our training arena. His desire to learn, inquisitive nature, boundless energy, and commitment to all that is good inspired us. It was an honor to help James with this requisite to obtain his merit badge.

Maya (bottom photo) volunteered for a day at the farm. Maya was the 2023 Intern for the Future of the Adirondacks at the Adirondack Land Trust, where CMVHR co-founder, Nancy has worked for the past 22 years. Maya's focus was inclusive conservation.

Maya quickly learned through a gentle touch and a smile that horses read and reflect our emotions. We also had the pleasure of working with several other young people who volunteered throughout the summer to learn about caring for rescued horses.

Education and outreach programs for people of all ages and abilities are as critical to our mission as saving horses. We also offer veterinary internships, high school job shadowing programs, and proudly work in partnership with local organizations like the Youth Advocate Program, OneWorkSource, and ACAP to help at-risk youth to realize their potential. Empowered youth are the next generation of change-makers, leaders, and advocates.

Some of you may remember the reprinted front page news story we shared in our Spring 2023 newsletter about Jeff Lang and his relationship with Mommy (one of our rescued horses). Per the article, Jeff was a "lost individual, apathy, the only emotion he seemed to demonstrate, the world through his eyes a gray monotone desert". His "mama horse" aka Mommy, helped Jeff find "the kaleidoscope of color that he now sees the world in".

Jeff, who has mild intellectual disability and resides at Mountain Lake Services, has been volunteering at our farm for seven years. His special relationship with Mommy helped Jeff find his voice and discover a passion for painting. When a local library read the story about Jeff's hope to one day hold his own art show, they reached out to offer him that opportunity (right photo). Jeff sold all of his paintings during the show and donated the funds back to the library.

The article about Jeff also inspired WPTZ Channel 5 (Hearst television) to come to our farm to film promotional clips for television. Dave, Brian, and Sam from Channel 5 were amazing and made the process fun

and comfortable for all, with lots of laughter and good cheer.
